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Say Hello to the iMac G5

So this is where we review the latest piece of hardware to come out of Cupertino, the new iMac G5. The problem is, once again, we've been beaten to the punch. Macworld and MacAddict have already published issues featuring the iMac G5. There are reviews from Time (*Gadget of the Week*), ABC News, CNN, The Wall Street Journal ("the most elegant desktop computer"), CNET, PC Magazine (Five Star Review), and every web site with the word "Mac" in its address.

With that in mind, so much for us doing a typical review. That's okay because it gives me room to tell you about all the little things that tended to get passed up in the bigger reviews.

A new feature has been added to the setup software you see when you first start up your new Mac. This new step in the setup process asks you whether or not you have another Mac. If you do, especially if you are upgrading from an older Mac (by older Apple assumes it has a FireWire port and Mac OS X), it'll walk you through transferring data from your old Mac to your new iMac G5. It'll transfer your entire User account, applications, and network settings. It'll do all of this via the FireWire port, which is four times faster than using

Ethernet.

Since the iMac is intended as a general consumer machine the iMac G5 is limited when it comes to expansion, just like all previous iMacs. The video card is as good as it gets and while you can upgrade the RAM, hard drive and optical drive you can't add additional internal drives and there are no PCI slots. Then again, if you know you need more than 250GB of hard drive space you may need to

start thinking about a Power Mac.

However there are some new features for those iMac owners who like to tinker. The iMac G5 has a large list of customer installable parts. With the iMac G4 you could install an AirPort Express card and had access to only one of the two memory slots (the other slot was restricted to service professionals).

With the iMac you have easy access to the AirPort Extreme slot, both memory slots, the hard drive, optical drive, power supply, LCD display, modem card, and the 'mid-plane assembly' which contains the logic board, G5 processor, and all three fans. There are also four diagnostic LED lights on the logic board, a first for Apple, which help to indicate the pass/fail status for the power supply, logic board, LCD, and temperature.


And if that wasn't enough there is

even a troubleshooting

assistant available via the Apple web site, which will ask you questions and offer troubleshooting suggestions based on your exact model iMac and the issues you are having. Of course, if you hate the idea of taking a screwdriver to your new iMac G5 you'll be happy to know the iMac G5 still comes with a one year hardware warranty (three

year warranty available with AppleCare) and all repairs can be handled by your nearest Apple Authorized Repair Center.

One of the most stated weaknesses of the iMac G5 is the lack of memory that comes with it. 256MB is just not really enough for anyone doing anything other than surfing the web, checking email, and word processing. But before you upgrade to a single 512MB

stick consider this, there are three memory speeds you can achieve depending on your memory configuration.

One memory stick will give you a single 64-bit bus, the slowest throughput. Two memory sticks of different size will give you two 64-bit buses, the average throughput. Two memory sticks of the same size will give you 128-bit bus, which is the fastest and most efficient configuration. So if expansion isn't in your near future consider getting a second 256MB stick instead of upgrading to the single 512MB stick.

iMac G5 Buying Advice

- Add more memory (512MB or more) but try to get two memory sticks of the same size for the best system speed.
- If you need more hard drive space get it at time of purchase. It'll be cheaper, won't leave you with a serial ATA hard drive which will be hard to resell, and you won't have to worry about the install.
- If you may be getting a Bluetooth device in the near future add internal Bluetooth at time of purchase. If you wait until later it'll cost you the same but you'll also have to give up a USB port.
- Keep in mind that the iMac G5 is not as powerful as the Power Mac G5. The Power Mac G5 features dual processors of equal or faster speeds, a much faster front side bus, and a lot more expansion options when it comes to memory, hard drives, and PCI slots. If you need a G5 for your professional work the iMac G5 is not a good, cheap substitute.

While most corporations fiscal years normally end in December, Apple, as always, has to be different. The company announced a net profit of \$106 million, or \$.26 per diluted share

for all of you stock holders, for the fourth quarter, ending September 25, 2004, during its recent fiscal conference call. These results include an after-tax restructuring charge of \$4 million.

To put these extraordinary numbers in comparison, Apple's reported net profit for the same quarter last year was \$44 million, or \$.12 per diluted share.

Apple reported revenue of \$2.35 billion for the quarter, up 37 percent from the same quarter last year This puts the company's gross margin at 27 percent, a four tenths of a percentage increase from

Interestingly, 37 percent of the quarter's revenue was solely from international sales.

An incredible 500 percent increase in the sales of iPods, or 2,016,000 units, accounted for a large portion of these profits. Apple also reported a 6 percent increase in Macs, selling 836,000 units over the same quarter last year.

"We are thrilled to report our highest fourth quarter revenue

in nine years," said Steve Jobs, Apple's CEO. "We shipped over 2 million iPods, our Retail store revenue grew 95 percent year-over-year, and the new iMac G5 has received phenomenal reviews and is off to a great start."

"We're pleased to report 37 percent revenue fourth quarter growth for the quarter and operating margin above 5 percent," said Peter Oppenheimer, Apple's CFO. "Looking ahead to the first quarter of fiscal 2005, we expect revenue of between \$2.8 and \$2.9 billion, - Steve Jobs operating margin above 7 percent and earnings per diluted share of \$.39 to \$.42."

> For the year, Apple reported net income of \$276 million on revenue of \$8.28 billion, where 2003 saw a net income of \$69 million on revenue of \$6.21 billion.



Mac 911 Help Desk

Help with Home Networking Cables

As easy as the Mac is to use, there are times when you get so frustrated by seemingly arbitrary limitations — a cable modem that won't work with your network, Internet Explorer cookies

that refuse to be deleted, or a beloved keyboard command changed to satisfy the perverse fancy of an Apple executive — that you're ready to return to pencil, paper, and slide rule. But don't give up on your Mac. Read on and relax.

Cable Capers

My home network uses a router with three Macs, a PC, and two laser printers. My cable provider allows multiple connections via networking

to the Internet over broadband. This worked well under OS

9. I recently moved to OS X, and my connection to the Web is
sporadic when I turn on Internet Sharing. Can you help?
Christopher Smith

Your networking setup is doing double duty. OS X's Internet Sharing is intended for connections that don't include a router. In a setup without a router, the host Mac (the one directly connected to your cable modem) handles the routing for you, directing traffic for other Macs on the network.

Because you already have a device for routing network traffic, you don't need Internet Sharing. Instead, switch it off, and configure your router to accept connections to the Web via its WAN (wide area network) port and to distribute IP addresses across your network through its LAN (local area network) port.

By the way, you may find that your cable modem has glommed on to the unique hardware address (called the Media Access Control, or MAC, address) of a device other than your router. If so, pull the power cable from the modem, to reset it, and then plug it into the router, to grab the router's MAC address. If that doesn't work (some modems resist this technique), clone the MAC address from the device the modem used to plug into (your Mac, for example) to the router. You'll find instructions for doing this in your router's documentation or on the router maker's Web site.

Out, Damned Cookies

Since upgrading from Jaguar to Panther, I haven't been able to delete all Internet Explorer (IE) cookies. When I reopen IE's Preferences, the cookies are still there. What gives?

Via the Internet

It's a bug, and an annoying one at that. The obvious solution is to move to a browser that doesn't have this problem. If, however, you prefer IE above all others, turn to a third-party utility for help. You can configure M. Atmani's \$10 Cookie Dog 2.0 to flush cookies from five browsers — Internet Explorer, Safari, Mozilla/Netscape 7, Camino, and OmniWeb — when you log in. Or try Allume (formerly Aladdin) Systems' \$30 Internet Cleanup, which includes Cookie Tosser, a utility that will put an end to any browser's cookies.

Drive Details

I have a 350MHz iMac and want to replace the hard drive with a roomier one. What kind of hard drive is compatible? Geoffrey Garrett

Your iMac, like all desktop Macs, takes a 3.5-inch ATA/EIDE drive. iMacs with CRTs included 5,400-rpm drives, and, because of heat issues, Apple recommends that you replace the original drive with another 5,400-rpm drive. But I can tell you that lots of people have put 7,200-rpm drives into their iMacs without their computers igniting.

You may find drives that boast Ultra ATA/133 performance. Although your iMac didn't ship with this kind of drive, Ultra ATA/133 drives work well in it. Just keep an eye on drive size. The CRT iMacs will recognize only 128GB of storage, so there's no reason to pay for a drive with greater capacity.

And while we're on the subject of replacing iMac drives, those of you with 333MHz or slower iMacs must partition a new drive so the first partition is no larger than 8GB. Once you've partitioned the drive, you must install OS X in that first 8GB-or-smaller partition.

I, QuickTime

I just watched a trailer for the movie I, Robot. The viewer is like a miniature Web site inside a QuickTime movie. Can I make something similar with QuickTime?

One of the coolest — yet most underused — features of QuickTime is its ability to display skins. If you have QuickTime Pro (\$30), open the I, Robot movie trailer and press Command-J to reveal the Properties window. Click on the first pop-up menu, and you'll see that the movie contains nine separate tracks: three video tracks, three soundtracks, a sprite track, a skin track, and a Flash-based video track. To better understand what these tracks do, choose Enable Tracks from QuickTime Player's Edit menu and switch tracks off and on.

From Here to There (and Back)

How do I network a Windows PC with Mac OS X 10.3.3? I bave only a regular network cable and a crossover cable.

At the risk of sullying these pages with instructions for mucking with a PC, I'll show you how to connect your Mac to a computer running Windows XP Home Edition.

Use Windows' Help and Support (found in the Start menu) to learn how to install the proper network protocol (TCP/IP in this case) so your network interface card works with an Ethernet connection. Now string that crossover cable between your Mac and PC.

To share a folder on the PC, right-click on the desktop, select New from the resulting contextual menu, and then select Folder from its submenu. Name the folder, using 12 or fewer characters. Right-click on the folder and select Network And Sharing from the contextual menu. In the window that appears, enable the Share This Folder On The Network option and, if you want to change files in the shared folder, enable the Allow Network Users To Change My Files option.

To view this folder from your Mac, select Connect To Server from the Finder's Go menu. Click on Browse. In the resulting Network window, double-click on the folder with the name of your Windows workgroup (likely called MSHOME or WORK-GROUP). Inside this folder, you'll see an icon with the name of your PC. Double-click on this icon and an SMB Mount window will appear. Select the name of your shared folder from the window's pop-up menu, and click on OK. That folder will appear on your Mac's desktop as a networked volume.

Fill Up the Garage (Band)

In GarageBand, bow do I take a single instrument and make it sound like an entire section of the same instrument playing at once?

Don't add multiple iterations of the same track -- you'll just use a load of CPU cycles to produce a sound no richer than that of the original track. Instead, slightly change one track's position in time or alter its timbre, or tonal character. Moving its position in the stereo field after making these kinds of adjustments will also help distinguish each track.

Here's how you go about it:

Place two copies of the same track in GarageBand. Pan one all the way to the left and the other all the way to the right. Double-click on the name of a track to bring up the Track Info window. Click on the Details triangle to reveal the track's effects.

From the first pop-up menu, which reads None, select AUDelay and click on its Edit button. In the resulting AUDelay window, push the Dry/Wet Mix slider all the way to the right for a setting of 100 -- this ensures that you'll hear nothing but the affected sound. Change the Delay Time to 0.0576 seconds to delay that instrument slightly. Set the Feedback slide to 0%, and move the Lowpass Cutoff Frequency slider all the way to

the right, to 22050 Hz. You'll now hear two distinct instruments coming from the mix's left and right channels.

Photos in TextEdit

I'm trying to create a resume in TextEdit that includes a photo. Is there an easy way to do this?

From the Macworld.com forums

Sure, just open TextEdit and select Make Rich Text from the Format menu. With Rich Text Format switched on, TextEdit supports graphics (with Plain Text it doesn't). To place a graphic in your file, either copy it to the Clipboard from another application (a graphics program or Preview, for example) and then paste it in, or drag it into the document.

You can use the Alignment controls to shift it hard left, hard right, or into the center. Alternatively, you can use tabs and spaces to position it.

Address Book to Entourage

I need to move contacts from OS X's Address Book to Microsoft Entourage X. In "Corral Your Contacts" (Working Mac, February 2004), you say it's easy using the vCard capabilities of both programs. I did that for each contact in a five-person group and it was super. But I have more than 500 contacts.

Your observation that Entourage imports only single vCards is correct. Fortunately, there's a way around the problem. Paul Berkowitz's \$19 Sync Entourage-Address Book 2 AppleScript (http://macscripter.net/scriptbuilders/category.php?id=1640) lets you import a slew of Address Book contacts simultaneously. This script synchronizes all Entourage fields to Address Book (and vice versa) and makes allowances for fields that don't correspond. For example, unmapped Entourage fields are placed in Address Book's Notes area, and Address Book's Instant Messenger fields are mapped to Entourage's Custom fields.

New New Folder

Although I'm bappy that Panther includes a way to customize keyboard shortcuts, I baven't been able to switch existing shortcuts. For example, I'd like to switch the Finder's commands for New Folder and New Finder Window to Command-N for New Folder and Command-shift-N for New Finder Window. Can I do this?

Just download a copy of DJ Gamble Software's free N Commander. Run the app, and it will reverse the New Folder and New Finder Window keyboard commands (see "The New Switcheroo").

will have the task of working with the membership to rework current SIGs, or create new SIGs, so that they better suit the needs of the membership.

Once an area of interest, location, date and time, and meeting coordinator, have all been established the duties of the Education Director are practically over. Meeting coordinators usually report the attendance and status of previous meetings, and the topics for upcoming meetings, allowing the Education Director to better focus his or her time on other things.

MacCollege is one of those 'other things'. We have a very good relationship with the Art Institute of Atlanta. With this relationship in mind AMUG should be able to offer more frequent

MacCollege events throughout the year. Our hope is for at least two events in the coming year, and possibly a third in connection to our larger Maclanta Xpo. The Education Director will chair the planning committee for MacCollege, and generally oversee the planning and scheduling of the events.

The other position on the board to be filled is that of Newsletter Director. With the unfortunate resignation of Todd Johnson there is an immediate need for a Newsletter Director to serve out the remaining term, which expires in December of 2005.

Ideally the Newsletter Director simply oversees a staff of volunteers who work together to layout, edit copy, pickup, label and post the newsletter. In reality the newsletter has not had a substantial staff in many years. One of the first duties of an incoming Newsletter Director will be to draft a staff of volunteers to help with the production of the newsletter.

From I-85 South


Take Peachtree Street exit 86. This exit becomes GA-13 S. Take Peachtree Street exit ramp towards Buckhead. Merge onto Peachtree Rd. NE. Travel approximately one-half mile, Macquarium building is on your left. Parking entrance is on far side of Macquarium sign next to R. Thomas.

From I-75 South

Take the Howell Mill/ Northside Drive Exit (#252). Go to the second ramp, which is Northside Drive. Turn left off the ramp onto Northside Drive. Go Approximately 1/2 mile to Collier Road and Turn Right. Follow Collier road 9/10 of a mile until it ends at Peachtree Street, then turn right. Macquarium is about 100 yards on the right.

From I-20

Head towards 75/85 connector. Go north on 75/85. Take the 14th / 10th Street exit. Pass over 10th street. Turn right onto 14th Street. Turn left onto Peachtree. Macquarium building is on your left, approximately one mile. Parking entrance is on far side of Macquarium sign next to R. Thomas.



From Ga. 400 South

Take the Sidney Marcus Blvd. exit, towards Piedmont Rd. Turn Left onto Sidney Marcus Blvd. Take the US-19 North/ Peachtree St. ramp North, towards Buckhead. Merge onto Peachtree Rd. NE. Travel approximately one-half mile, Macquarium building is on your left. Parking entrance is on far side of Macquarium sign next to R. Thomas.

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
